

During Camp

Phone Calls

- ☆ There are two times during each day when parents can call. Only one call per week so everyone can talk to their families.
- ☆ 4 MINUTES for each call. It should be plenty of time to tell mom and dad all the fun you're having at camp.
- ☆ Campers cannot call home unless arranged with their cabin counselor and the unit leader.



Mail

- ☆ Parents love receiving mail. Write them letters when you can.
- ☆ You MUST write a letter home each Sunday. They will be collected during Reading Period.
- ☆ Care packages with food in them are not allowed. All packages must be opened in the office.



Emails

- ☆ You may not send or receive email while at camp.

What if I Lose Something?

- ☆ If you drop your toothbrush in the dirt for example don't worry, we can get you another. Talk to your counselor.

Visiting

- ☆ Family visiting weekend is the second week of the session.

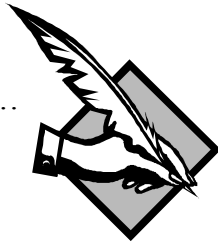

Before Camp

Pre-Camp Letter

- ☆ Introduce yourself to your counselors
- ☆ Let them know the important stuff about you...
 - What are you good at?
 - What you want to learn at camp?
 - What is your favorite color?
 - What do you love to do?



- ☆ Keep an eye out for a letter just like it from your counselor!

Code of Conduct

- ☆ Read each section carefully. It is very important.
- ☆ These are the basic rules you are agreeing to go by:

- Making friends and relationships at camp

- ☆ Sign the last page, have your parent sign too, and return it along with your other forms...keep the first two pages.

What to Bring

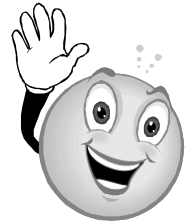
Making Friends
